


# Kashmiri Carpets

Designs in Kashmiri carpets are deeply symbolic and heavily inspired by nature. Floral motifs, such as chinar leaves, lotuses, and vines, are common. The Tree of Life, a recurring symbol in many carpets, represents growth, immortality, and spiritual connection. The intricate borders, central medallions, and fine curvilinear designs are all woven with great precision, often taking months or even years to complete a single piece.

Colors in Kashmiri carpets are rich yet soothing, with popular tones including deep blues, ivory, reds, and soft greens. The dyes are traditionally derived from natural sources, such as pomegranate rinds,

indigo, and saffron, ensuring that the colors do not fade easily over time. These natural tones lend the carpets a timeless charm that suits both classic and contemporary interiors.

Kashmiri carpets are entirely handmade, with every step—from spinning the yarn to knotting the design and finishing the piece—done by hand. The looms used are horizontal, unlike the vertical ones used in many other regions, which adds to the unique structure and texture of these carpets. The finishing process includes washing, trimming, and polishing to ensure a high-end sheen and smooth feel.

Owning a Kashmiri carpet is not just about aesthetics; it is also about appreciating a rich cultural legacy. These carpets are highly valued in international markets and are often passed down through generations as family heirlooms.
